CCISD Planning Process for ESSER III Application

Meetings and Dates

- Survey released to stakeholders – sent electronically to parents, posted on the website in 2021
- CCISD representative left surveys at local businesses including the local clinic in 2021
- Survey feedback – Discussed at District Planning Team meetings
- District Planning Team Meetings with Campus Representation regarding Use of Funds and RIPICS – June 24, 2021, June 29, 2021, May 24, 2022, June 15, 2022 and December 5, 2022.
- Student Input Meeting – June 24, 2021, May 24, 2022, June 15, 2022 and November 15, 2022
- CCISD representative met with community members via mobile meetings (including meeting with local clinic and Dr. Howard – local physician) to discuss ESSER III and RIPICS – July 6, 2021
- Public comment meeting – July 22, 2021 at 6:00 and July 23, 2021 at noon, July 19, 2022 and July 21, 2022, December 12, 2022

Processes

- Clarendon CISD analyzed local data and recent STAAR data along with previous years data to determine if learning loss had occurred due to COVID-19 pandemic and identified gaps in learning
- Clarendon CISD reviewed data received from staff, student and community surveys regarding use of ESSER III funds and RIPICS
- Clarendon CISD met as a district to determine needs at all three campuses
- Clarendon CISD representative met with community members regarding spending of funds and RIPICS
- Clarendon CISD met as a district committee to review current spending and review future expenditures for 2022-2023

Use of Funds

- Required to dedicate at least 20% (\$141,226) toward learning loss
- Clarendon CISD dedicated funds (\$254,879) toward learning loss by providing summer school, after school tutoring, accelerated reading, instructional supplies and instructional contracts

- Clarendon CISD dedicated funds (\$156,531) toward student social and emotional learning by purchasing sensory paths, character education programs, additional play area promoting social and emotional learning and play while providing appropriate distancing and professional development to provide mental health services and support
- CCISD dedicated funds (\$42,000) to improve and enable the operation of schools to reduce the risk of virus transmission and exposure to environmental health hazards and to support health needs
- Clarendon CISD dedicated funds (\$311,500) toward stipends for summer school, after school tutorials, reading academies and retention.
- Clarendon CISD dedicated funds (\$168,253) toward improving indoor air quality in school facilities
- CCISD dedicated funds (\$155,760) to technology ensuring ALL students and employees have equal access to technology
